TEAM MULTI-ACADEMY TRUST LONDON RESIDENTIAL

More than 110 Children from Beaford Community Primary School, Brayford Academy, High Bickington Academy, Horwood and Newton Tracey Primary School, Pilton Bluecoat Academy, Umberleigh Academy and Witheridge Academy went on a 4-day residential trip to London this term.

The adventure was created to enrich students' understanding of history, culture, and science while fostering collaboration and creating lifelong memories. The itinerary was packed with immersive experiences, transforming the young explorers into wizards at Harry Potter Studios, aspiring leaders at the Houses of Parliament and curious adventurers at iconic landmarks across London.

The children also had the opportunity to engage with Selaine Saxby, North Devon's MP, and Matt Hancock, a former Health Minister, during Q&A sessions. The trip continued with the children enjoying views from the London Eye, an underwater adventure at the Aquarium and exploration of the Natural History and Science Museums. The historic Tower of London gave the opportunity for the children to learn about the secrets and legends of the past too.

The highlight of the trip was a night out at the theatre, where students were transported into diverse narratives, sparking discussions about standing up for what's right, celebrating individuality and the importance of leadership and community.

The children were FANTASTIC and Mr Manning, Mrs North were so impressed with their perseverance, politeness and cheerfulness on the walk. I was then offered the chance to complete my teacher training while at Pilton Bluecoat Academy. It has always been my dream to become a primary school teacher, so I jumped at the chance. While completing this, I got married and had my first child, no one can ever tell me I do things by half! One of my best memories of this was teaching the year 5s about carbon dioxide with vinegar and bicarb. Needless to say, those children who are in year 11 now, still remember letting the balloon go and covering themselves in vinegar!

As a fresh faced NQT, I was lucky enough to go and run the Foundation Stage Unit at High Bickington Academy with Mr Norton. The 6 months or so was lovely as Lockdown had a lot to answer for during my time there! Having then 3 incredible years at Pilton Bluecoat Academy as a teacher where I was able to take my teaching to new levels. Surrounding myself with some very clever people who use big words that I have no understanding of nor can sound out phonetically! I am now on my next adventure at Beaford Academy, helping to run the Early years provision.
